
Why the Chips are Down

The big story of 2021, other than the endless and ongoing story of COVID-19 (has it been two years already since we first started hearing about Coronavirus?), has been the chip shortage. We've heard about it every week, most often in the context of automobile production and supply. But maybe you're not exactly sure what they've been talking about and have been too embarrassed to ask. Thankfully, the "chips" are not Ruffles or Doritos - those remain in good supply. Exactly what are the "chips" we've been hearing about for so long, and where did they all go?

The simple answer to that first questions is "microchips". The answer to the second question is a little more complicated. So I will try to provide you with a little bit more information about chips to crunch on, but not to overwhelm you with information, I'll explain in manageable bytes (see what I did there?)


Another word for microchips is "semiconductors". If you don't already realize it, these microchips comprise the heart of every modern electronic device, and you are surrounded by them at almost every moment of your life. They live in your cell phones, televisions, kitchen appliances, home computers and tablets, coffee makers, toasters, electric razors, sonic toothbrushes and hairdryers, and virtually every other modern convenience that surrounds you. Even your credit card has a small microchip embedded in it. Without these "chips", our day-to-day lives would be very different indeed. Eliminate all of these microchips from your life, and you would feel like you were living in a Little House on the Prairie with the Ingalls. The chip shortage you've been hearing about refers to a global shortage of these microchips, impacting production of countless commercial, industrial and residential products.



The newest microchips fit 50 billion microtransistors on a fingernail-sized chip. As you can imagine, the manufacturing process of these chips is very complex and requires extremely precise conditions. But while these chips were invented in America (in 1947), the number of US manufacturers has declined severely over the decades. Thirty years ago, 37 percent of all microchips were made in America. Today, that number is approximately 10 percent.

Construction of a factory capable of manufacturing these chips in quantity can cost \$10 billion, far beyond the financial reach of most companies. As a result, the number of these operating facilities has been on a steady decline.


What many don't realize is that the shortage of microchips existed even before the pandemic, with factories around the world waiting three or more months for delivery of ordered microchips. The pandemic only made the situation worse. As COVID started to take hold,

many factories closed and the availability of raw materials and labor needed for the manufacture of chips began to decline around the globe. Increase in demand for consumer electronics (home computers, tablets, video game consoles and televisions) began to spike with hundreds of millions of people confined to their homes. Orders for chips began to pile up, and a backlog of demand began to grow. Currently, it can take manufacturers up to six month to fill an order for chips.

The pandemic has not been the only cause of production constraints. In February, 2021, winter storms and power outages in Texas forced some of America's only chip plants to halt production. Japan's Renesas plant, which creates almost one-third of the chips used in

cars around the world, was severely damaged by a fire in March, 2021. In June, 2021, severe drought in Taiwan affected chip production due to the need for water in the manufacture of chips.

The cause of the chip shortage wasn't just with manufacturing, as distribution has also been stymied. As COVID advanced through Asia, shipping ports shut down, including the Yantian port in China, through which 90 percent of the world's electronics move. Hundreds of container ships were left waiting to dock. Even when ports reopened, the backlog of orders and shipments continued due to labor shortages impacting transportation hubs. Shipping containers full of goods sat on the docks with no means to load them onto the ships.



Anticipating a long term decline in demand for new vehicles, auto manufacturers had canceled and cut back on their orders for microchips at the start of the pandemic. With reduced orders from the auto industry, chip companies retooled factories to focus on production of chips for consumer products, attempting to meet the explosive demand caused by the pandemic. As a result, a shortage of car chips ensued. The shortsighted decision by car companies to cancel chip orders has left manufacturers struggling to rebuild inventory needed for the manufacture of automobiles, trucks and SUVs. A combination of events in 2020 created the perfect storm, leading to higher demand and lower supply of the chips needed worldwide for automobile production.

Most estimates suggest that the chip shortage will continue into late 2022, and likely into 2023. Plans to increase chip production in the US are underway, but it would be years before new facilities constructed in the US by automotive chip makers such as NXP and ON Semiconductor Corporation are able to begin production of chips in a quantity sufficient to meet demand.

Hopefully, you better understand what is meant by the chip shortage and why it has been such an issue for the auto industry. If you have plans to buy a new car in the near future and you can wait, you may be wise just to put your plans on hold. If you need a new vehicle now, be prepared for empty dealer lots, and to pay a premium due to increased demand and reduced production output. In the meanwhile, sit back on the couch, turn on the new LED TV, open a fresh bag of Lay's, and enjoy the chips you already have.


























Clif Notes


